Kitted out in Hi-Viz vests and tough gloves, and armed with litter-picks provided by Highland Council, our group of eleven cheerful volunteers set out recently to clean up roadside verges in parts of the Ferintosh area. No blade of grass was left uncovered as we scoured roadside verges in and around Culbokie, through the woods and parts of Corntown.

We expected to fill a few bags in two hours, but were absolutely staggered by the sheer volume of litter crammed into 14 bags: so much plastic, dozens of wine bottles and cans, sweet and chocolate wrappers in abundance, countless cigarette butts, broken glass, several discarded masks and more. There was also the grim discovery of fly tipping down at the parking area near the A9 junction (an abandoned Hotpoint electric cooker too heavy for us to uplift and several broken hoover parts.)

Another dimension to our recent litter-pick was taking photos of all the items in plastic packaging. As part of a Plastic Protest campaign, #ReturntoOffender, we will be forwarding the photos in a bid to challenge companies responsible for unnecessary avoidable single-use packaging.

It was depressing to find such load of rubbish in our neck of the woods, and even more soul destroying to discover that within 24 hours of the litter-pick, a collection of beer cans, plastic bottles and wrappers littered most of the areas cleared the previous evening.

However, we're not going to let litter louts beat us and intend to organise more litter-picks in the future. ## **CCT History Group report – August 2020**

Modern history in the making.

Whilst it has been interesting researching the past history of the village we mustn't lose sight of the fact that things happening now will be of interest to people in 20, 50 or 100 years' time.

We have recorded changes in the monthly indoor Community Market which has emerged as a very successful weekly market during Covid with traders, on their own initiative, operating from their vans. We have also recorded the current work at Findon hall to cater for people asking in the future "just when was the Findon hall re-roofed?" Unfortunately we have been unable to uncover any significant details of the demolishing of the original Findon Hall in the late 1960s/early 1970s and the building of the current Hall in 1975. We'd welcome any photographs that illustrate this very significant time in the life of the village.

We would also like to improve our records of village housing developments. We have recorded the history of Schoolcroft - but developments such as Mount Eagle Drive and Court, and Ferindonald have gone unrecorded and we would welcome any photos or information that exist. We will cover developments at Fowlers Croft and Glascairn as they unfold. All information will be included in the Social History section of the web site.

Also within the Social History section is information about the Culbokie Guided Walks that have taken place recently. These have been much enjoyed by those taking part and more can be arranged if there is demand.

## **Culbokie Community Market – outdoor stalls/vans**

Saturday Markets will continue during October from 1000-1100 in the Car Park beside Culbokie Church Centre. There is a wide range of market traders who are continuing to supply the local community with local food produce and crafts. They are following the Scottish Gvt guidelines and most will take contactless card payments. Social distancing is being observed.

Fresh produce available includes fish, venison, pork, lamb, beef/bacon/burgers etc. vegetables and fruit, chocolate and cakes. Also available are craft products, wool, pottery plus face coverings and cleaning materials.

Look out for news on the Market on 21st November when we aim to have a Christmas theme.

## Facelift to Findon Hall

Most people in the village will be aware of the works going on to repair the roof of the village hall. The existing roof had become porous and the Committee has been fundraising for some time to finance the replacement of the roof. Our architect friends at Colin Armstrong Associates prepared drawings and Ramsay and Chalmers Engineers provided us with drawings and a bill of quantities to allow us to get prices for the work to be done and the committee set about applying for grant.

Finally, an offer of grant was received from the FCC Communities Foundation followed by a smaller amount from the Energy Savings Trust which allowed us to think that the vision of a warm and watertight hall might become a reality! Highland Council also gave us £4300 representing third party funding as required by FCC Communities Foundation which is a not-for-profit business that awards grants for the community projects through the Scottish Landfill Communites Fund.

We now realised we could afford to paint the hall as well which was going to make a huge difference to the building. ARK Estates had also gifted us a cycle shelter but this would need to be installed.

Work began as soon as lockdown lifted but we quickly realised that additional work was required. The window cills of the hall were crumbling and needed repair. The boiler room doors were rotten and so was much of the outer cladding of the boiler ducts - more money!

A further business grant was awarded due to COVID and it was decided that we would try to upgrade the existing toilets. Findon Hall has never had a proper toilet suitable for wheelchair access as there was no space within the existing toilets. That was disgraceful in this day and age but it had always been prohibitively expensive. However, when added at the same time as the new roof, it became more achievable. ARK Estates offered to pay for that extension to allow the work to be done at the same time as the roofing and with a huge effort from Colin Armstrong Associates, ARK,

Highland Council and IBI Joiners the relevant permissions were gained in record time. We now have a full disabled toilet with space for child changing and we were able to upgrade the existing toilets as well! Our contractors helped hugely with this. ANM Electrical donated lighting and Gavin MacDonald Flooring laid the new safety flooring free of charge.

Outside more work was required which we hadn't initially anticipated. A new path was required to come from the new fire exit. Travis Perkins donated slabs, concrete and sand for the path which was laid by Russell and Struan MacKenzie of Aardvark Plant at no cost to the hall and they also tidied the area in front of the newly installed cycle stand with some tar.

Back inside the hall, we had at one point looked at improving the Committee/Community Room by insulating it, repainting it and improving the door but we didn't think the finances would allow. We would really like to make better use of this room in future for book groups, reading groups, craft groups, etc but it was cold and dreary. We applied to Highland Council who gave us a further grant. This was matched in kind by our generous contractor, IBI Joiners who insulated and repainted the room and ANM Electrical who improved the lights and tidied the dangling cables. IBI Joiners also cleared some of the garden to the rear of the hall to make this a more usable space.

Many thanks to all of those contractors, organisations and individuals who contributed to the hall upgrade as it grew arms and legs!


It would have been brilliant to have had an opening BBQ or party but that isn't going to be a possibility in the short-medium term but hopefully the hall will be able to open soon for some activities. We hope that the level of insulation together with the automated lights in the store and toilets will reduce costs for the hall and that together with the new cycle stand to encourage cycling, will improve the environmental footprint of our hall.

I made this soup for Mabon (Autumn Equinox) It was one of the best soups I've had in ages, so I thought I would share the recipe with you all and include it in this months

### **Creamy Squash soup**

#### Ingredients

olive oil 2 tbsp

onions 2, roughly chopped

carrots 2, dicedcelery 2 sticks, diced

garlic 2 cloves, roughly chopped

butternut squash 1kg after peeling, cut into chunks


chicken stock 1.2 litres double cream 150ml

nutmeg for grating (optional)

### Method

STEP 1


Heat the olive oil in a pan and fry the onions, carrots, celery and garlic until soft. Add the pumpkin and cook for 5 minutes, then tip in the stock and simmer until the pumpkin is soft and you can mash it with the back of a spoon. Add the cream and cook gently for 2-3 minutes. Put everything in a blender and whizz until smooth (or use a stick blender). Gently reheat to serve, grating over a little nutmeg, if you like.



## CULBOKIE CHURCH ACTIVITIES

Our Sunday morning services continue to be live-streamed from the manse at 11am on <a href="https://www.cruparish.online.church">www.cruparish.online.church</a> and via facebook (and available on Youtube afterwards). In addition, from September the Culbokie Church Centre, and our sister church in Cromarty, have been open for folk to watch the service there. The Covid-19 regulations require church goers provide their name and contact details in the NHS Scotland Test & Protect record book, follow the one-way system in the church, wear masks and sit 2 metres apart. Hand sanitiser is available on the way in and out of the building. Like many other aspects of life at the moment it does feel decidedly strange compared to pre-Covid days, but it's great to see other people and feel part of an actual rather than virtual congregation again. We've been holding mid-week bible studies via Zoom, led by Rev. Mike Rattenbury, with the next session starting on Wednesday 14 October. This platform has worked very well for these meetings, enabling us join with folk in Cromarty from the comforts of our own home – especially welcome as winter approaches.

Despite not being able to hold the usual Macmillan coffee morning event at the Cubokie Church Centre in September, a magnificent sum of £680 was raised through people organising their own small coffee mornings at home and from donations.
