Culbokie Active Travel Route

Thanks to everyone who responded to the recent CCT consultation on our developing plans for an Active Travel Route through Culbokie. We were delighted to see that the great majority agreed with our proposals, and we also welcomed some really useful suggestions to improve the plans-which, as far as possible, we'll integrate into the next stage. This will lead to technical plans, which can then be used to put the construction work out to tender. We will also be working closely with The Highland Council over the next weeks and months. They have already said they support the plans in general terms, and now we need to ensure they are comfortable with the details, and agree to formally adopt the new infrastructure.

Our contacts at Sustrans have produced a <u>summary of the</u> <u>consultation results</u>, including more details about how we are responding to the comments.

For anyone who has missed the details of what is planned, there is more information available on the CCT website.



Slow cooker Sticky Toffee Pudding

Ingredients
250g pitted dates, chopped
100g butter, plus extra for the
basin

4 tbsp treacle
1 tsp vanilla extract
250g light brown soft sugar
300ml double cream
2 eggs, lightly beaten
200g self-raising flour
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
vanilla ice cream, to serve
Method

STEP 1Put the dates in a heatproof bowl, cover with 150ml boiling water, and leave to soak for 30 mins. Butter a 1-litre pudding basin and line the base with baking parchment.

STEP 2Tip half the butter, half the treacle, the vanilla, 75g of the sugar and the cream into a pan set over a medium heat. Cook for 4-5 mins, stirring, until the sugar dissolves. Turn up the heat, bubble for 3 mins, then whisk in a pinch of salt. Pour a third of the sauce into the basin.

STEP 3Beat the remaining butter, treacle, sugar and the eggs together, then fold in the flour, bicarb, ¼ tsp salt, the dates and their soaking liquid. Spoon into the basin and smooth the surface, leaving a 1cm gap from the top. Cover with a double layer of baking parchment and foil, making a pleat in the middle so the pud can expand. Secure with kitchen string.

STEP 4Set the slow cooker to low. Sit the basin inside, then add boiling water so it comes halfway up the basin. Cover and cook for 7-8 hrs. Run a knife around the edge of the pudding and turn out onto a plate. Reheat the remaining sauce and pour over. Serve with ice cream.

Many thanks for your continued support and many donations.



The results of the Black Isle Photo Competition 2021

In the child category, Ellen Hogg gained first prize with her entry, 'Potatoes in Bloom', and second with 'Fruit of the Sea'.

This novel public transport system has been operating in the Ferintosh Community Council area now for the past seven weeks. Although there are over seven months to go in this pilot project, we thought we'd capture the initial experiences of those who have tried it out. As you'll read below, not everything has been perfect but the enthusiasm to make this pilot successful is palpable.

A personal story

"Travellers Joy - my experience of using the Ferintosh Community Bus

My background to Bus travel:

To set the scene - I used to be a regular bus user but personal circumstances as well as Covid 19 meant that I had to abandon bus usage and take my car.

I loved the bus - in spite of the occasional downsides at that time such as the commuter service being removed from the village and relocated to a stop on the slip road to the A9 without shelter in the teeth of rain snow and wind, occasional bus breakdowns etc. The social aspect and camaraderie more than made up for the glitches. I made new friends from the village that I would otherwise not have met - an added bonus!

I was therefore delighted to be able to take a trial journey on the Ferintosh Community Bus (thereafter FCB) a couple of weeks ago and thought I'd relate my experience to you all, especially if you weren't sure about taking this kind of journey for the first time!

I live in a rural part of the Ferintosh Community Council area, and in the past have had to either take the car to Culbokie or can sometimes stand at the side of the B9169 for a connecting bus coming to and from Cromarty to get to Inverness using public transport.

For me, to now be collected and delivered to my doorstep by the Ferintosh Community Bus (FCB) is a complete luxury!

My FCB experience began with consulting the Stagecoach timetable, which I believe each household in the FCC area should have had delivered to them.

(The FCB collects you from your house and takes you to Tore Service Station to connect with a Stagecoach bus going North or South.)
So, the first thing you need to do is decide which service bus you want to connect with at Tore, then work backwards, as it were, with your travel plan. The first time you do this is, as with many things, the most difficult. Figure out how long it might take from your house to Tore (in my case 20 minutes allowed a 5minute leeway). Having put together the travel plan, phone CSI Ross-shire to book your journey (s) on the FCB. You'll find their two contact numbers on the leaflet.

I guess the biggest perceived downside to this is that one needs to book at least the day before, but REALLY? What's so hard about that? We have all had to make much more dramatic changes to our lives in the pandemic, thinking ahead isn't so onerous - a new habit is perhaps the way to look at it.

My first attempt at phone booking was a response by answering machine - I did leave a message and it was responded to within an hour, but do check the opening times of CSI Ross-shire please.

The day of my maiden voyage, the bus and driver (Mike) turned up at the agreed time and we set off for Tore. On arrival at Tore service station, Mike parked the bus and consulted an App to ascertain the arrival time of the connecting bus. My fellow passenger that day had time enough to pop into the cafe there and get a takeaway coffee while I stayed on the FCB.

The service bus arrived and we transferred from one bus to the other. No being left to the vagaries of the Highland weather by FCB!

Ticketing was dealt with by FCB and showing one's onward ticket to the next bus driver was all that was required, then onward to Inverness - my destination of choice.

The return journey was equally easy and pleasant. No rushing at all in any direction. Kindness and consideration was the order of the day.

In conclusion of this travelogue (lengthier than I intended), I'd very much like to encourage folk to try this service. It is such a joy to be collected from home and vice versa. We are so privileged to be a pilot for this kind of travel. Phase 2 with an electric vehicle should begin around the end of September.

To the folk who are unsure, haven't thought about the day they may not be allowed/able to drive, or are quite simply against such an idea - I say to you all PLEASE GIVE IT A TRY!

When I was small - we were all young once - my parents encouraged me to try new foods and experiences. I was constantly surprised that most were actually quite pleasant, even though I thought I'd really dislike them!

And some brief comments:

"Excellent initiative that will make a real difference to those living off grid."

"The main lesson I took from my trip to Inverness on the community bus was that the A9 buses pulling in to Tore service station may be heading either south to Inverness or north to Tain and as they may not always be running exactly to the timetable it is essential to check a bus's destination before boarding. When two buses pulled in one behind the other at about the time an Inverness bus was due I got on the first one without thinking, realised when the buses were fortunately halted by traffic at the roundabout that it was heading for Tain, and thanks to the considerateness of both drivers was able to change buses and continue my journey to Inverness and avoid what could have been considerable inconvenience".

"I have, so far, only used the bus once but I found it to be extremely easy to use and the bus driver very friendly and helpful"

"The service is always on time, reliable and easy to book the day before".

Unfortunately, it has been brought to the attention of the Culbokie Community Trust (CCT) and Fertinosh Community Council (FCC) that entrances to our beautiful woods are becoming littered with dog mess.

Dog fouling is not only deeply unpleasant, but also dangerous. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can cause Toxocariasis - a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and, in some cases, blindness and seizures.

Whilst most dog owners are caring, responsible individuals, there are still some people who do not clean up after their pets, or think it is acceptable to hang dog poo bags from trees!

We would like to urge everyone to take pride in where we live and act responsibly as dog owners to ensure we eradicate this problem. Please always pick up after your dog and use the dog poo bins that are provided.



Culbokie Church Centre activities

As the Covid restrictions have eased, we've been gradually resuming activities in the Culbokie Church Centre. It's been great to meet together for the Sunday morning service, and to sing, albeit still wearing face masks. We and our linked church in Cromarty bought some live-streaming equipment earlier in the year, and we now have a blended approach on Sunday mornings – with Terry present at one of the churches and live-streaming to the other church. The services are also still available online at www.cruparish.online.church and via Facebook (and on Youtube afterwards). Currently the service is continuing at 11am, as we work out what our 'new normal' will be going forward. We're also resuming our mid-week bible study after a break over the summer, though this will continue to be on Zoom for the time being.

The Church Café opened its doors again in August, after 17 long months. It's held at the usual time of 1.30-3.45pm on Tuesday afternoons. We're using the main church room, as well as the kitchen and middle, to provide more space, and operating table service. It's an ideal opportunity to meet old friends, and make new ones, over a cuppa and a sweet treat. There will be a special Macmillan Fundraiser on Tuesday 21st September from the earlier time of 12 noon, with soup as well as delicious home bakes available.

The Senior Citizen's Friendship Group has also resumed, meeting 2-4pm on the first Monday of the month until the end of the year: 4th October,

1st November, 6th December. Contact Maureen Rose on 877435 for further information.

And last but not least, the Walking Group is getting back into their stride on Thursday mornings, meeting at 10am outside the Church Centre.

AUGUST 2021

Since taking over the role of Chair in May I am glad to see that thankfully progress is being made and we have now started to open things up again. People are able to get together and meet up with family which has been something we have all missed over the last year. Dealing with a pandemic has certainly given us all a lot to think about, and perhaps ponder on the need to do things differently.

We have had several volunteers wishing to continue helping our community, and we now have a dedicated Ferintosh volunteer group.

We have 2 new members of FCC who kindly put themselves forward to be co-opted members, so FCC continues to support residents throughout the area. FCC has continued to meet regularly online, and discuss items of interest or concern to residents, and through our regular meetings we have had updates on some of the projects underway in our patch.

The pilot for the Ferintosh Community Bus continues very successfully. There is an article dedicated to a journey in this edition, so I shall let you enjoy reading about that. As someone who has no regular bus services to our area it is great to be able to arrange a pickup from your door and a return drop off at your door. I am looking forward to my trip on the bus with my granddaughter, and I understand that there are several older people in my area looking forward to a trip into Inverness via the FCB as well.

At a recent meeting Culbokie Community Trust gave us an update on the progress of their Active travel plans. They have now moved onto the next stage of the process and we are interested to see the progress in the months ahead.

I was invited to go and look at all the lovely work done during lockdown on the Quilt Squares which are now displayed in Findon Hall. These have been done by residents and give us an idea of how people felt during the lockdown, and their impressions of how they dealt with the very difficult situations which happened whilst not being able to get out and share these as we would normally do. I understand that a leaflet with details of each square will be produced. These are beautifully created and

something which I would encourage everyone to go and look at once we are able to visit halls again.

A recent Black Isle Festival called Think Health Think Nature was held and encouraged us all to take time out and enjoy the beautiful walks and environment in which we live. There were guided walks and tours around our villages giving details of local landmarks and a history of the area. Thanks to those involved in organising this and I am sure we will see further Festivals in the future.

FCC has a plea for residents to become Pothole volunteers. We are currently involved in a pilot scheme with Highland Council Roads which will help identify and resolve potholes on our worst affected roads. If you would like to know more about this and get involved with the challenge of using modern technology to report these, please let Bruce know via email and he can give you the details of how you can help in this exciting pilot.
