





Highland-wide Highland Council Pension Fund

- recognises that the Pension Fund started 2021 with a very low greenhouse gas intensity from its shareholdings, approximately half that of an average global investment portfolio
- notes that the Fund has, in the course of 2021, now transitioned circa half of its actively managed shareholdings to be run on a Paris Accord-Aligned basis, which has reduced the already low greenhouse gas intensity even further
- recognises that the Pension Fund's Paris Accord-Aligned portfolio will not rest at that already low level and will deliver an approximate 7% year-on-year reduction in greenhouse gas intensity from its investments in line with the target reductions set out in by the IPCC in 2018 in order to achieve a rapid pathway to net-zero and limit global warming to 1.5% by 2050
 - Successful campaign with Highland Palestine, Friends of the Earth Scotland, Fossil Free Highlands and many others
 - TBI contribution led by Peter Moffatt



Highland-wide - Future Communities Highlands and Islands

New collaboration between Highland groups

TBI directors Julian Paren (Convenor) and Peter Moffatt recently attended an online meeting hosted by Planet Sutherland with the objective of exploring how local community and environmental groups in the highlands could work more closely together. (10 May)

Anna Patfield of Planet Sutherland wrote before the meeting

The Highlands and Islands climate and environmental groups frequently come together in meetings, and frequently duplicate events delivering these to individual groups. There seems to be some sense in joining forces to share out the workload organising these events and also to reduce the pull on those we are asking to speak. It's considered that for some topics (e.g. waste), whole area events would be followed up with local events to devise local action plans. Some events however would do well simply at a higher level. We may of course additionally decide to work on other initiatives together: deep discussion; films; climate cafes for instance. A possible name for the group is Future Communities Highlands and Islands.


