

Culbokie Green Takes Shape

Culbokie Green has finally emerged from the mounds of earth and rocks on land opposite Culbokie Store, and the official 'handover' of the site from Tulloch Homes to Culbokie Community Trust (CCT) took place on October 14th. Handover is a bit of an odd word to use because the land is already owned by CCT on behalf of the community – but Tulloch Homes had taken it in hand in order to do the hard work of shaping the ground and putting in the path network. With the exception of some peripheral areas which are still being used by Tulloch Homes, the Green is now ready for us to take over and complete. Plans include wildflower meadows and trees, seating, a covered timber shelter with a living roof, a natural play area for younger children, a community orchard and some family games including outdoor table tennis. Completing our plan depends on getting the required funding - and we'd like to record our thanks to Tulloch Homes for giving us a brilliant start with some serious in-kind help beyond works that are required as part of their planning consent. This has included the formation of a path looping through the Green and other ground works worth around £9,000. We'd also like to record thanks to Findon Farms for donating some large boulders that will become clambering rocks in the natural play area. We look forward to seeing them arrive on the site soon.

Funding from the Highland Coastal Communities Fund will enable us to start the planting work on the Green including native tree and orchard planting and creating some willow structures. We will be looking for

volunteers to assist with this work once all the land

and trees are available to us. Funding from HITRANS will also enable us to crack on with installing the solar lighting along the main path and for cycle parking at the bus stop. All the wildflower sowing has been supported by the Mushroom Trust and will be undertaken by Tulloch Homes in early spring to ensure good germination rates.

Following a couple of recent enquiries about the large drainage basin in the corner of the Green nearest the shop, we'd like to confirm that it is not expected to hold water for the vast majority of the time – although it may hold some water for short periods after severe rainfall. The basin will be sown with a wildflower mix to attract the butterflies and bees. Unlike the rest of the Green, it is not owned by CCT and will become the official responsibility of Scottish Water.

A NEW green space is taking shape in Culbokie as a community group works in partnership with housing developers.

A tree planting marked the start of Culbokie Community Trust's work on Culbokie Green as Tulloch Homes announced it has sold its entire development of 25 bungalows at the adjacent Glascairn Meadows.

A deal has also been struck with Cairn Housing to build 14 affordable homes as part of the development.

Tulloch has also been a key partner, along with Sustrans, in developing an active travel route between Culbokie Green and the rest of the village.

Ingredients Serves: 30

- 100g butter
- 100g caster sugar
- 125ml treacle
- 1 egg yolk
- 250g sifted plain flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ginger
 - 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg



Method

Prep:20min > Cook:10min > Ready in:30min

- In a large bowl, cream together the butter and sugar until smooth. Stir in treacle and egg yolk. Combine the flour, salt, baking powder, bicarb, cinnamon, cloves, ginger and nutmeg; blend into the treacle mixture until smooth. Cover, and chill for at least one hour.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 180 C / Gas mark 4. On a lightly floured surface, roll the dough out to ½cm thickness. Cut into desired shapes with biscuit cutters. Place biscuits 5cm apart on ungreased baking trays.
- Bake for 8 to 10 minutes in the preheated oven, until firm. Remove from baking trays to cool on wire racks. Ice or decorate when cool.

Culbokie Community Cycle Club News

CCCC is an informal club for cyclists of all abilities and interests (well, all except Tour de France hopefuls and the like!). During the summer we ran a programme of evening rides, but with daylight getting in shorter supply the club is now in winter mode, with weekly group rides mostly being organised during daylight hours. (Athough we may have one or two off-road night rides over the winter.)

The club is also organising some training courses over the winter. We had an excellent one-day first aid course last month, so we're prepared if we do have an accident on a group ride, and we are planning an essential maintenance course to make sure we don't get stranded by the side of the road when things go wrong. And we were particularly pleased with our "Couch to 20 km" programme, which came to a finale in September with a ride to Dingwall and back. The programme was organised over six sessions, each including some top tips and a group ride of gradually increasing length. It was great to see the four participants increase their fitness and confidence over the six weeks. We reckon the final ride was actually 28 km, but we were fortified by cakes at Ems & Co café on Dingwall Station (other cafés are available!). And it was nice to get this positive feedback: "The programme was excellent, well thought out and nicely paced. I feel so much more confident in cycling and testing my limits. Hills are not as frightening as they were. I intend cycling as much as possible for local trips in preference to driving - which was always my goal. Well done everyone, it was no mean feat!" We aim to run the programme again next Spring, once the days are long enough to get out in the evenings again.

For anyone interested in joining us, membership is free and there are no obligations. There's a short form to complete which can be downloaded from the CCT website, or email cycling@culbokiect.org. We would also be delighted if anyone is able to offer a venue for the bike maintenance courses – we need somewhere dry, with space for 7 or 8 people with their bikes!



A Challenging Puzzle for Ferintosh Volunteers

Over the past 18 months, Ferintosh Volunteers have tackled a range of tasks: clearing the garden and play area behind Findon Hall, tackling litter in various corners of the Ferintosh area, creating a Christmas Tree Trail in Culbokie Wood, and running a request line for anyone needing practical help, especially during those early months of lockdown last year. However, our most recent project caused the most head scratching.

Local resident, John Brierley, who has limited mobility, is a keen photographer and naturalist. He requested help to move his bird hide from one location to another some 100 metres away. A team of four volunteers (Paul Wadge, Bob Neish, Peter Wrigglesworth and Angie Morris) aimed to complete the job before dusk fell. Did we have the right tools and equipment? Would it be possible to move the hide in one piece? More crucially, if we take it apart piece by piece, would we be able to reassemble it *in the right order*?

The team decided to dismantle and rebuild the hide; the task gave them the satisfaction of tackling a giant jigsaw puzzle of oddly shaped pieces.



John gave advice on the best position for locating the hide at exactly the right angle so that he will be able to capture good photographs of the kites and buzzards swooping on to the bird table. The easiest part of the project by far was fixing the bird table, although it was tempting to linger to admire the stunning view over the fields beyond.



The completed hide offers John a great perspective from which to view birds of prey and wildlife. The new position of the hide, in its open setting, will mean that he will be able to take photographs of the kite with its long thin wings. John is delighted with the result. He asppreciated the help from 'efficient, and enthusiastic volunteers - a job well done.'

Culbokie Community Trust History Group report.

A conversation with Angus Bethune, who has a long family connection with Culbokie, has now established that the author of a map of the village compiled in c1976 was his mother, Mary, who ran the post office when it was located at the family house, Glentyan. The fact that it had been drawn on official Post Office poster should have made us more suspicious regarding Captain Elliot's involvement, who it was assumed to be the author. Mary produced it for the benefit of a postman who was based in Conon Bridge and whose round included Culbokie. Quite how it came into the possession of Captain Elliot is not known and gives rise to a further puzzle as Captain Elliot is shown as being in residence in his new-build property "St Martins" in the village and also out at the farm, St Martins, at the north-eastern boundary of the village.
