Funded by the Black Isle Area Committee, through the Place Based Investment fund, the aim of the plan is to provide a Black Isle wide vision for the future. It will build on existing consultations and surveys and over the next few weeks we will be consulting with communities across the Black Isle to find out what your priorities for the Black Isle might be. There will be eight drop-in events held in Community Council areas across the Black Isle, where we'll be seeking your views.

What do you want the Black Isle and your communities to be like in the future? What are the changes you would like to see? What kind of voice do we want to have, sitting in the middle of the Greenport bubble?

Your answers will give you and your Community Council real influence over the future of your community, because they will be the basis of the Black Isle Local Place Plan - a new feature of Scottish planning legislation that influences Council planning policy and public services. To achieve that, the first stage is for you to tell us what really matters to your communities. Please drop in at one of the March events for a chat and a cuppa.

Then, over the next few months, we'll organise more events with residents, businesses, Community Councils, Highland Council councillors and staff, and other groups and organisations to work out how to tackle what matters to you in the future. The work is being funded by the Council, so we hope it will have a real impact.

Our logo *Opportunity Black Isle* is in response to the awarding of Greenport status to Opportunity Cromarty Firth. We are not in any way affiliated to the Greenport. We want to highlight the fact that we're responsible for creating our own opportunities. The Local Place Plan gives us, the local community, a great opportunity to determine what life on the Black Isle will look like in the coming years. We look forward to working together.

The Community Engagement Event for Ferintosh Community Council area will take place Thursday 16th March, 3.00pm – 8.00pm at Findon Hall, Culbokie. Come along, enjoy a cup of tea and some cake and share your views with us. We'd like to hear from as many different folk as possible. It's really important we gather a wide range of views from all sectors of the community.

The History Group

Exposed at Low Tide

Given the open aspect of the view down to the Cromarty Firth many of you will have observed what appear to be unusual shapes in the mud/sand at low tide and whilst walking and cycling past wondered about their significance. We are referring to the remains of fishing yairs. Those associated with the history of Culbokie are located just below Findon Mains and below Urquhart Farm next to the burial ground for the former Urquhart Church. All that is left of the yairs are the foundation stones, as the wooden posts, nets etc. would have soon rotted once they went out of use.

One very obvious 'structure' that can be observed to the south from the causeway as you approach the Black Isle (drivers take care) is a rectangular area created with stones. The purpose of this has not been conclusively discovered. Any ideas – answers on a postcard as they used to say.

Culbokie Community Cycling Group



Culbokie has a thriving (but not particularly athletic) cycle club, with weekly social rides planned for the evenings once the clocks change, plus occasional longer rides, mostly based around local cafes. For anyone wondering if this might suit them, here's an account from one of our members:

"It was early 2021 that, out of the blue, I decided to take up cycling again not having been on a bike for over 40 years. It was when I needed a bit of advice on my newly acquired second hand bike that I first came across the Culbokie Cycle group. What a welcome I got! They are a friendly bunch and although a few of them are very experienced cyclists they are in no way scary!

They lead regular social cycle rides of varying lengths. I found these 'led' cycle rides an ideal way of getting back into cycling. I have to admit, at this point, I had never actually been 'into cycling'. The last time I cycled I didn't even have gears on my bike!

In the course of my first few rides I learnt, with a lot of patient support, how to use my gears properly. What a difference gears make particularly when negotiating the hills around Culbokie!

Thanks to the Culbokie Cycle group I have discovered many different local cycle routes and have become more confident on the road. I may still always be at the tail end of the group, huffing and puffing but I have never felt left behind nor that I am holding the group back. The rides are, above all things, social rides and everyone who goes, sees them as such.

Last year the Cycle group ran a 'Couch to 25K' which my adult son took part in. This was a graduated course over 6 weeks which took a complete beginner and helped them build up their knowledge, ability and fitness, culminating in a 25K cycle – which included a coffee/cake stop. He thoroughly enjoyed it and will now confidently cycle to Cromarty or Dingwall on his own.

My 'cycle journey' has been a positive one – there really is nothing more satisfying than cycling on the Black Isle on a beautiful sunny day. It is food for the soul!"

For anyone who wants to know more, the group will be at the April Community Market with two e-bikes available on short loan (and quite a few group members use e-bikes to flatten the hills a bit!). 
