TBI's Million Miles campaign gathered details of woodland paths, farm tracks and quiet back roads for exploring the Black Isle. This third edition of the map extends the area surveyed and adds more

For venturing further, the 147-mile John o' Groats Trail from Inverness to John o' Groats crosses the Black Isle in its first two stages. www.black-isle.info/walking



The Black Isle has numerous quiet roads and off-road tracks and paths enjoyable year round. Some off-road tracks can become very wet and icy in the winter, when only hardy mountain bikers should attempt them. The map shows 13 cycle routes with off-road alternatives, with route cards for downloading. Our Cycle Route Planner lets you create your own itinerary.

For venturing further, the 1665-mile National Cycle Route 1 from Dover to Shetland crosses the Black Isle with a choice of routes in summer whenever the Cromarty to Nigg ferry operates.
